How to use this pattern

Please, read the whole pattern through properly, so you have a good overview.

First, you will find the parts that make up this design, the materials used, and the abbreviations that you must know to read the pattern instructions.

The "Quick Legend" is a series of words that you will find next to the title of each part so that you can get an idea of how that piece is worked.

Below you will find some general tips that you should keep in mind during the entire process of crocheting this design. Everyone has a personal way of working, but I will tell you my recommendations to get the best result.

Later you will find some tutorials of generic processes that I usually use in almost all my creations, which will surely be helpful if you do not know them.

Now you will find the main pattern!

Then you will find the charts only of the parts that need visual help. Note that not all parts of the pattern will have a chart.

Finally, you will see some images of the design and one page with links to my social networks and my online stores.

And most importantly, have a lot of fun making this pattern!

To start...

This amigurumi is made up of the following parts:

- · 1 Head with 2 Ears, 2 Cheeks, 1 Nose and 3 Hairs.
- · 1 Body with 4 Legs and 1 Tail.
- $\cdot\,1\,\text{Scarf}.$

Measurements (length): 5.9 inches (15 cm).

Materials

2.75 mm crochet hook.
3.25 mm crochet hook.
Fiberfill (*Poly-Pellets optional*).
Scissors & needle.
Stitch Marker.
2 Amigurumi Safety Eyes 8mm.
Thread: Just a little of Black.

Sport yarn (Scheepjes Catona): 505 Linen (5 grams), 157 Root Beer (45 grams), 162 Black Coffee (just a little), 222 Tulip (just a little).

Sport yarn (Scheepjes Stone Washed): 833 Beryl (5 grams).

Quick Legend

You will find these short instructions next to the name of each part so you have a quick idea of how you should work that part before you start.

xx mm	Hook / hooks size used in this part. Example: 2.75mm.
SPIRAL	This part is worked in spiral, continuously. When you finish a round you will continue with the next one.
JOINED	This part is worked in joined rounds. Finish the round with 1 sl st in the first stitch of the same round
	and start the next round by adding 1 ch (to work 1 sc), 2 ch (to work 1 hdc) or 3 ch (to work 1 dc).
CT	TI: 1 11 1 1 1 CC

STUFFING This part will need stuffing. **NO STUFFING** This part will not need stuffing.

General Tips

Always use stitch markers. Place it on the first stitch to know where the round begins. This will help you count the stitches and follow the pattern without making mistakes.

Use the proper tension for the yarn and hook you are using, but I recommend always working very tight. If you crochet too loosely, you may need to use a smaller hook.

One of the most important processes when making amigurumi pieces is the stuffing. You must stuff each part enough. Sometimes you'll think it's fine, but you may be able to add a little more. This will make the pieces take their final shape correctly. On the other hand, if you see stuffing starting to appear between the stitches (and you've used the correct tension), you may be stuffing too much.

Stuff the pieces of this design little by little while you crochet them, making this process much easier and obtaining a better result. It is very complicated to stuff the parts correctly when they are almost finished.

Amigurumi safety eyes are not recommended for children under 3 years of age. In this case, you must make embroidered eyes in the same position indicated by the pattern.

Note that the orientation of all parts of the pattern is set looking at the project from the front.


Sometimes, sewing parts with Super Bulky yarn, like Katia Bambi, can be a complicated process because this yarn frays easily. You can use a trick and sew these parts using another easier-to-use yarn, such as a Sport yarn like Scheepjes Catona, looking for the most similar color.



Generic Processes

Sew Edges

It's an easy process. Just take your piece, flatten it, and sew the open edges closed. Depending on the pattern, you should fasten off or leave a long tail to sew it later (photos 1 & 2).



Invisible Join

Skip next stitch. Insert the needle into both loops of next stitch, pull yarn through (photo 3). Insert the needle through the back loop of the starting stitch (photo 4) and tighten it just enough so that the join looks like a regular stitch (photo 5).


Depending on the part you are working on you should leave a long tail to sew later or weave in the end.



Close using the stitches from the last round

Pull the yarn out of the last stitch. Now with your needle, pass the yarn tail through the front loop of all the stitches of the last round (from outside to inside) and pull it tight to close the piece (photos 6, 7 & 8).

Then pull the yarn through the center of the piece and fasten off (photos 9 & 10).





Generic Processes


Attach a New Yarn

Make a loop on your hook with the new yarn (photo 11).

Now take it off your hook. Insert your hook in the previous stitch of which you must attach in new yarn (if the pattern says to attach a new yarn in the fourth sc of the round, you should insert the hook in the third sc of the round). Insert the loop you made earlier with the new yarn in your hook (photo 12).

Pull through the stitch (photo 13).

Make the stitch in the usual way, inserting the hook in the stitch where you should attach the new yarn (photos 14 & 15).



Color Change

I make the color change at the final part of the last stitch that you must work with old color.

Work the last stitch of the old color as usual, until you only have 2 loops on the hook. Take the yarn of the new color, grab it around the hook (photo 16) and pull through the 2 remaining loops on your hook (photo 17). The next stitch you make will be the first of the new color (photo 18).

Head 2.75mm | SPIRAL | STUFFING

This part is worked continuously. With Linen yarn create a Magic Ring with 6 sc.

Rnd 1. 6 sc inc (12 sts).

Rnd 2. * 1 sc, sc inc * repeat 6 times (18 sts).

Rnds 3 - 4. 18 sc (18 sts, 2 rnds).

Rnd 5. * 1 sc, sc inc * repeat 3 times, 12 sc (21 sts).

Rnd 6. * 2 sc, sc inc * repeat 3 times, 12 sc (24 sts). Close with invisible join and fasten off.

Rnd 7. Attach a new Root Beer yarn in 8th sc of Rnd 6. 10 sc, 4 sc inc, 10 sc (28 sts).

Rnd 8. 10 sc, * 1 sc, sc inc * repeat 4 times, 10 sc (32 sts). **Rnd 9.** 10 sc, * 2 sc, sc inc * repeat 4 times, 10 sc (36 sts). **Rnd 10.** 10 sc, * 3 sc, sc inc * repeat 4 times, 10 sc (40 sts).

Rnds 11 - 16. 40 sc (40 sts, 6 rnds). Don't fasten off.

It's time to add the eyes. I used amigurumi safety eyes for this pattern. Place them centered, between rounds 9 and 10, but don't secure them with the washers!. For your reference the eyes have a distance of 12 sts between them. Remember to place the sc increases from Rnds 7 to 10 up (photo 19).



Preparing the Tension to the Eyes

When you make tension to the eyes, the head will take its final shape. Stuff the head and follow the steps below:

Thread a needle with a new piece of yarn (Root Beer color).

Insert the needle through the bottom of the head and pull it out near the right side of the right eye (photos 20, 21 & 22).

Now insert the needle at the left side of the right eye (photo 23).





Then pull the needle out through the bottom of the head at the same place you started (photo 24).

Thread a needle with a new piece of yarn.

Repeat the same process with this new yarn with the left eye (photo 25).

Now is the time to secure your amigurumi safety eyes with the washers.

Put the head aside, you'll continue working on it later...





Nose 2.75mm SPIRAL NO STUFFING

This part is worked continuously. With Black Coffee yarn do 3 ch.


Rnd 1. (4 sc) in 3rd ch from hook, working now in the opposite side of the foundation ch, (4 sc) in next ch (8 sts).

Rnd 2. 8 sc (8 sts). Close with invisible join and leave a long tail for sewing that piece later.

Cheek (x2) | 2.75mm | SPIRAL | NO STUFFING

With Tulip yarn create a Magic Ring with 6 sc.

Close with invisible join, but only on these pieces, you must do it without skipping any stitches. Leave a long tail for sewing that piece later. The cheek will now look like it has 7 sts (although it actually only has 6 sts) (photos 26, 27 & 28).





The nose does not need to be stuffed. Now sew it on the head. Place it centered, between rounds 2 and 4. Then make a long stitch down (2 sts length) (photos 29 & 30).



Sew the cheeks on the head. Place them on both sides of the head, right and left, between rounds 9 and 11. Fasten off.

For this process I have separated a new piece of Tulip yarn into several thinner strands. By sewing with these finer threads you will obtain a less visible seam and the final result will be better (photos 31 & 32).



Now you can choose to give the tension to the head at this time or leave it for later. I'm going to explain the process now because some beginner crocheters prefer to do it this way because some may lose these tails inside the head and cannot catch them later.

I personally prefer to do it when the head is completely finished. If you prefer this other option, don't worry, leave the eyes tails as they are now and I'll let you know when it's time to do it later in the pattern.



Apply Tension to the Eyes

Take the two yarns at the bottom of the head of one eye and pull a little to add tension (photo 33). When you have the desired shape, tie a knot with the end of these tails.

Do the same with the tails of the other eye, making sure that both eyes have the same tension (photo 34).

Now hide the knots inside the head (photo 35).



Continue with the Head

Rnd 17. 11 sc, * 3 sc, sc dec * repeat 4 times, 9 sc (36 sts).

Rnd 18. 12 sc, * sc dec, 2 sc * repeat 4 times, 8 sc (32 sts).

Rnd 19. * 6 sc, sc dec * repeat 4 times (28 sts).

Rnd 20. * 2 sc, sc dec, 3 sc * repeat 4 times (24 sts).

Rnds 21 - 22. 24 sc (24 sts, 2 rnds).

Rnd 23. * 2 sc, sc inc, 3 sc * repeat 4 times (28 sts). Close with invisible join and leave a long tail for sewing that piece

later.

Ear (x2) | 2.75mm | SPIRAL | NO STUFFING

This part is worked continuously. With Root Beer yarn create a Magic Ring with 6 sc.

Rnd 1. 6 sc inc (12 sts).

Rnds 2 - 4. 12 sc (12 sts, 3 rnds). Close with invisible join and leave a long tail for sewing that piece later.

Sew the ears on the head. Keep in mind that I have sewn them with open edges. This way you should sew the front edge between rounds 15 and 16 and the back edge between rounds 16 and 17. For your reference the ears have a distance of 8 sts between them (photos 36 & 37).







First Hair 2.75mm NO STUFFING

With Root Beer yarn do 6 ch. Leave a long tail at the beginning.

Row 1. 1 sl st in 3rd ch from hook, 3 sl st (4 sts). Leave a long tail for sewing that piece later.

Second Hair | 2.75mm | NO STUFFING

With Root Beer yarn do 4 ch. Leave a long tail at the beginning.

Row 1. 1 sl st in 3rd ch from hook, 1 sl st (2 sts). Leave a long tail for sewing that piece later.

Third Hair | 2.75mm | NO STUFFING


With Root Beer yarn do 5 ch. Leave a long tail at the beginning.

Row 1. 1 sl st in 3rd ch from hook, 2 sl st (3 sts). Leave a long tail for sewing that piece later.

Placing the Hairs

First locate the center of the head (between the two ears), between rounds 14 and 15. Now you will place the first hair just to the left of this point (in the image the green pin indicates the center of the head and the pink pin the place where you will put the first hair) (photo 38).

Insert the first tail of the first hair through the first hole of the first pin, and the second tail through the hole of the second pin. Now tie these tails into a knot on the inside of the head. For the following photos I have used a hair of a contrasting color for a better visualization (photos 39 & 40).



Now place the second hair just to the right of the first (using the same technique).

Finally place the third hair in the center of the other two, just one round behind, between 15 and 16 (photo 41).





To make the eyebrow, with black thread you can make one diagonal stitch above each eye, on round 12, to give it a more fun expression. The length of each stitch is about 2 stitches.

If you haven't already, this is the time to give tension to the eyes (photos 42 & 43).





Body | 2.75mm | SPIRAL | STUFFING |

Tip: You can use Poly-Pellets (weighted craft beads) to give the amigurumi more stability. Make a small white cloth bag with the size of the bear's body, stuff it with poly-pellets and sew the edges. Finally place the bag in the body (in the back) and finish stuffing the holes with fiberfill. This will make the amigurumi body weigh more and have more stability. This type of filling is not recommended for babies (photo 44 & 45).





This part is worked continuously. With Root Beer yarn do 14 ch.

1 sc in 3rd ch from hook (photo 46), 10 sc, (4 sc) in next ch (photo 47), working now in the opposite side of the foundation ch, 11 sc (photo 48), (4 sc) in next ch (photo 49) (30 sts).










Rnd 2. * 11 sc, 4 sc inc * repeat 2 times (38 sts).

Rnd 3. 12 sc, 2 sc inc, 2 sc, 2 sc inc, 12 sc, 8 sc inc (50 sts). **Rnd 4.** 34 sc, *1 sc, sc inc * repeat 8 times (58 sts).

Rnds 5 - 17. 58 sc (58 sts, 13 rnds). Fasten off (photos 50 & 51).




Attach a new yarn in 2nd sc of round 17.

Rnd 18. * 8 sc, skip 7 sc, 5 ch, 7 sc, skip 7 sc, 5 ch * repeat 2 times (50 sts). You will close the gap of the last leg when

you do the first sc next Rnd (photo 52).

Rnd 19. 50 sc (also work the chains from the previous round) (50 sts).

If you are going to use poly-pellets, add them now (photo 53).









Last Rnd. Work this round continuously to the end. You will not need to use the stitch marker. 42 sc dec. At the end you will have 8 sts.

Close the body using the stitches from the last round (see the tutorial at the beginning of the pattern) (photo 54).



Leg (x4) | 2.75mm | SPIRAL | STUFFING

Attach a new Root Beer yarn in 3rd ch of the gap of the first leg.


Rnds 1 - 4. 12 sc (12 sts, 4 rnds) (photo 55).

Rnd 5. 12 BPsc (12 sts).


Back Post sc (BPsc):

To do the BPsc for round 5 follow these steps:

- **1.** Insert the hook into the next stitch from inside to outside (*photo 56*).
- **2.** Then insert the hook into the next stitch from outside to inside (photo 57).
- **3.** Yarn over, draw yarn through two stitches (photo 58).
- **4.** Yarn over, pull yarn through all loops (photo 59).



Stuff the leg and close it using the stitches from the last round (photos 60, 61 & 62).








After doing the 4 legs you will have this result.

If the bear's legs stick out a little bit, you can solve this by adding a small stitch with a new Root Beer yarn and your needle, between the inside of the leg (take the yarn out between Rnds 3 and 4) and the bottom of the body and pull it tight (photos 63, 64, 65 & 66).



Tail | 2.75mm | SPIRAL | NO STUFFING

This part is worked continuously. With Root Beer yarn create a Magic Ring with 6 sc.

Rnd 1. * 1 sc, sc inc * repeat 3 times (9 sts).

Rnds 2 - 3. 9 sc (9 sts, 2 rnds). Close with invisible join and leave a long tail for sewing that piece later.

Place the tail on the center back of the body and sew the top edge between rounds 6 and 7 and the bottom edge between rounds 7 and 8 (photos 67 & 68).





Sewing the Head

Now sew the head to the body. To do this, place it centered at the front, slightly tilted upwards. The upper edge of the neck will be located at the edge of the foundation chains and the lower edge at round 10 of the body.

Stretch the edge of the bear's neck and use pins to hold it in place to give you a good result (photos 69, 70, 71, 72, 73 & 74).



Scarf 3.25mm

With 3.25mm crochet hook and Stone Washed Beryl yarn do 55 ch.

Row 1. 1 dc in 3rd ch from hook, * skip next ch, (1 sc + 1 dc) in next ch * repeat 25 times, skip next ch, 1 sc in next ch (52 sts). Fasten off.

Place the scarf around the bear's neck and tie a knot. Optionally you can add some stitches so that it does not move.



Big Version

To make my big version use Super Bulky yarn (*Katia Bambi or Himalaya Dolphin Baby*) and a 4mm crochet hook for all parts except for the cheeks and nose, which you should use Scheepjes Catona and a 2.75mm crochet hook.

Note: I used a 4mm crochet hook to work the Super Bulky parts of this version. If you crochet tightly, you might want to use a 5mm crochet hook.

Use the following colors:

Super Bulky

Original Version Big Version
Linen Off White
Root Beer Brown

Scheepjes Catona

Original Version Big Version
Tulip Tulip

Black Coffee Black Coffee

Scheepjes Stone Washed

Original Version Big Version

Beryl Beryl

This yarn frays a lot. Use another easier-to-use yarn to sew the parts together in a similar color.

I have also used Catona Jet Black yarn and 12mm amigurumi safety eyes for this version.

Head 4mm

Work it the same as the original version.

Use Catona Jet Black yarn to make the eyebrows.

To give tension to the eyes in this version you must use a Scheepjes Catona yarn in a similar color.

Nose 2.75mm SPIRAL STUFFING

This part is worked continuously. With Catona Black Coffee yarn do 4 ch.

Rnd 1. 1sc in 3rd ch from hook, (4 sc) in next ch, working now in the opposite side of the foundation ch, 1 sc, (4 sc) in post sh (10 sts)

in next ch (10 sts).

Rnd 2. * 1 sc, 4 sc inc * repeat 2 times (18 sts).

Rnds 3 - 4. 18 sc (18 sts, 2 rnds). Close with invisible join and leave a long tail for sewing that piece later.

Stuff the nose and sew it on the head. Place it centered, between rounds 2 and 4. Then make a long stitch down (2 sts length).

Cheek (x2) | 2.75mm | SPIRAL | NO STUFFING

This part is worked continuously. With Catona Tulip yarn create a Magic Ring with 6 sc.

Rnd 1. 6 sc inc (12 sts). Close with invisible join and leave a long tail for sewing that piece later.

Sew the cheeks on the head. Place them on both sides of the head, right and left, between rounds 9 and 11. Fasten off.



Ear (x2) 4mm

Work them the same as the original version.

Sew the edges of the ears following the instructions of the Generic Processes: Sew Edges. You must close the edges in this version because this type of yarn tends to fray and it is more difficult to sew them with open edges.

Then place them on the head and sew them between rounds 15 and 16.

Hairs 4mm

Work them the same as the original version.

Body 4mm

Work it the same as the original version.

Leg (x4) | 4mm

Work them the same as the original version.

Tai 4mm

Work it the same as the original version.

Scarf 3.25mm

With 3.25mm crochet hook and Stone Washed Beryl yarn do 7 ch.

1 dc in 3rd ch from hook, skip next ch, (1 sc + 1 dc) in next ch, skip next ch, 1 sc, turning chain (5 sts).

Rows 2 - 76. 1 dc in next sc, skip next dc, (1 sc + 1 dc) in next sc, skip next dc, 1 sc in next ch, turning chain (5 sts, 75 rows). Fasten off.

Place the scarf around the bear's neck and tie a knot. Optionally you can add some stitches so that it does not move.

White Version

To make the White version you must use white yarn for all the parts of the amigurumi and Scheepjes Catona Jet Black for the nose. The Scarf is made with Scheepjes Stone Washed 828 Larimar.









