This pattern doesn't include any crochet lessons. Difficulty: *elementary*.

My name is Kseniya and for past three years crocheting is my hobby. I'm absolutely obsessed with crocheting Amigurumi toys and photographing my toys in the best way to preset my creations. Perhaps, the idea to combine these two kinds of expressing myself is the true reason why I'm so obsessed with amigurumi and that is why we are both here to crochet the swetest scarecrow with wide a smile - Joe.

Only one year ago i did prepate to the Hallowen crocheting some one else patterns and today I create my own. It's a really big deal for me.

Someone says crafters create somethig that looks like they do. Something that inspired with his own vision and soul. And here I am - the cute smiling scarecrow. What can be more symbolic, right? I'm a scarecrow who brings a smile to strangers and find the reasons for it everyday.

Now I would like you to share the experience with me in creating something new and cute! It's time to create your own scarecrow with a wide smile called Joe, he will bring only good vibes and memories.



Joe doesn't remember how he became to be Joe... He just remembers the morning he appeared in the middle of a field. The sun was high in the sky, the smell of freshly cut grass and a small, almost invisible cloud in the sky. There were also some black birds...

JOG'S STORY

He remembered the loud, hoarse voices of the black birds. It scared him and he felt the urge to close his ears, but... he hand no ears and no hands to close his ears with. He wanted to close his ears so much. He didn't even have a mouth! He only had two button eyes – a big orange coat button and a small blue button. Joe hanged from an old broomstick. His clothes were old pajamas and his body was filled with straw. He had no arms or legs. His head sadly wobbled in the wind. The worst part was the hot sun that burned his head and eyes. Joe doesn't remember for how long he lived in the field. He thought about the noisy black birds, about where they go and why do they always come back. 
These materials are only a list of my recomendation to help you create the toy like mine. You could use any type/size of the yarn and the hook, but you must understand it will affect the toy's final look.

## factors to consider when Determining yarn Amounts

**1.** The first and the most obvious factor is a **crochet hook size**. If you will use the yarn mentioned in the materials list and a crochet hook size other than recommended one, it would affect the yarn amount necessary for your project. If you choose a larger crochet hook, then you will need much yarn and if you go for a smaller crochet hook - then you will need less yarn than it is specified in the material list.

2. The second factor – your typical tension when crocheting. The gauge and tension is going to make a difference with the amount of yarn used because it allows for more or less space between stitches. The tighter your stitches, the less yarn you need.

**3.** The third and very important condition – **your stitches shape**: V-shape, X-shape/semi-X. The stitch shape depends on what crochet technique you use – yarn over or yarn under.

If you wrap the thread, placing the hook underneath the yarn strand (circular movement of the hook from the right to the left) – this makes **V-shaped stitch**, if you put the hook over the yarn strand (circular movement from the right to the left) – this makes **X-shaped stitches**, and if you make yarn under then yarn over, this technique gives us **semi-X stitches**. You will need much more yarn for the fabric made in Yarn Over technique compared with the amount needed for Yarn Under technique.

Why did I specify the yarn density in the materials list? If you don't have the same brand that I recommended, You should use the yarn weight as substitution with any risk of miscalculation for the toy and clothes sizes.

The number in brackets at the end of every round means a total number of stitches in the round,

(...) \* n - means that you should repeat the combination of stitches n times.

### In this pattern we use US terminology.

Choose the correct hook size which is appropriate for the yarn you are going to use. Your choice can be different from mine, but please pay attention to the fact, that the size of the toy and the clothes will be different when you use other yarn and other hook size.

Use a stitch marker for your convenience and rounds counting.

The scarecrow is crocheted in **semi-X stitches**. Shift stitches are calculated precisely for this technique. If You crochet the stitches with Yarn Overs, then You will need to determine the symmetry of the pieces and the number of shift stitches and their location by yourself.

Stuff all the pieces as you go, firmly (unless otherwise stated), gradually adding small portions of stuffing and forming necessary shapes of pieces.

**About yarn change.** I recommend to change color in the last stitch of a round, before you start the round with a new color. Work this last stitch with thread of a new color in the following way: pull up a loop with the yarn you're working with and then finish with yarn new one.

**About increases.** I make invisible increases - work in FLO, but it's easier to make classic increases in some stitches - in both loops.

The scarecrow measures is 25 cm tall (9.8 inches) in case of using the materials listed and crocheting in **semi-X stitch**.



Starting with beige yarn #1106. Make two pcs.

6 sc in MR (6)
 6 inc (12)
 3-4. 12 sc (12), 2 rnds,
 (5 sc, inc)\*2 (14)
 6-11. 14 sc (14), 6 rnds, change color to orange#89
 12. BLO: 14 sc (14)
 13-33. 14 sc (14), 21 rnds, fasten off.


Fill the arms not tightly, only 2/3 of the whole arm.

CUFF:

Place the arm with the tip facing down and attach the thread of color #89 to the front loop of 11th rnd, where we have crocheted into back loops only. Make 3 rounds with 14 sc.

Turn out the cuff on the wrong side, fasten off.







The cuff crocheting.





Starting with the yarn of the dark-brown color #70.

Making 8 chain stitches. 1. from the 2nd stitch from the hook: inc, 5 sc, 3 sc into 1 st. on the other side: 6 sc. last 6th stitch is crocheted into the stitch where we started from(16) **2.** 2 inc, 5 sc, 3 inc, 5 sc, inc (22) 3. (sc, inc)\*2, 5 sc, (sc, inc)\*3, 6 sc, inc(28) 4. 11 sc, (2 sc, inc)\*3, 8 sc (31), change color to light-brown #40.

Draw an outline around the countour of the foot on carton (or any other polymer material). If you will wash the toy in the future, don't use the carton because it will be damaged during the washing. Cut out two boot insoles.

#### 5. BLO: 31 sc (31)



6-8. 31 sc (31), 3 rnds, make 3 shift stitches after the round 8 and replace the marker. Now the round starts here. Put the boot's insole into the foot.





**ATTENTION:** you can just put the insole into the foot and press it with fiberfill or you can apply a very small amount of a strong glue to the one of its side to fix it. I've use a glue.



37. the 1st leg: 24 sc, sl st (24), fasten off.

the 2nd leg: 24 sc (24) + 21 **shift stitches**, don't cut the thread.

#### CUFF:

Then crochet the cuffs on the legs and on the boots.

Place the foot like you see on pic and attach the thread of **light-brown** color to the **front loop** of the round **12**. The foot must be placed with the heel facing up. Crochet **16 sc**. Fasten off.

To make the cuff attach the thread to the **front loop** of the **round 16** in the same way - the heel is facing up and crochet 3 rounds with **16 sc**. Fasten off.

Do the same with the 2nd leg.







The quantity of **shift stitches** in **round 37** on the *2nd leg* depends on your own yarn tension and can be different.

How to make a right quantity of shift stitches?

Put the legs on the desk and fold its upper part like you see on pic. The stitches which are placed in the middle of the inner fold - are the stitches you shoul connect with the chain. *Mark it*. Then count how many stitched you need to crochet after end of the **round 37**.









ATTACHING THE LEGS:

Continue to work, make **4 chain stitches** and 1 sl st into the markered stitch on the 1st leg.

We've attached two legs to one another.

**38.** 24 sc along the 1st leg (last stitch into sl st), 4 sc along the ch, 24 sc along the 2nd leg, 4 sc along the ch (56), put the marker.

**39.** 24 sc, 4 inc, 24 sc, 4 inc (64)

40. 24 sc, (sc, inc)\*4, 24 sc, (sc, inc)\*4 (72)

**41-44**. 72 sc(72), *4 rnds*, after rnd 44 make **10 shift stitches** to move the beginning of the next rounds and the marker position.

If your thread tension is different from mine, you should correct quantity of shift stitches by yourself. The start the next round make sure that the marker is located I n the middle of Joe's right side.

45. (10 sc, dec)\*6 (66)
46-48. 66 sc (66), 3 rnds
49. (9 sc, dec)\*6 (60)
50-53. 60 sc (60), 4 rnds
54. (8 sc, dec)\*6 (54)
55-59. 54 sc (54), 5 rnds
60. (7 sc, dec)\*6 (48)
61-63. 48 sc (48), 3 rnds
64. (6 sc, dec)\*6 (42)
65-66. 42 sc (42), 2 rnds

Pay your attention to the simmetry of the arms location. Please correct it according to your thread tention and position of the legs. Maybe you will need to make other quantity of stitches at the beginning or at the end of the round.

**69.** (4 sc, dec)\*6 (30), crochet **7 st** of **each arm** which were left free according to stitches combination.

70-71. 30 sc (30), 2 rnds









# 72. (3 sc, dec)\*6 (24) 73. (2 sc, dec)\*6 (18) + 4 shift stitches, replace the marker and change the thread to the dark-brown

color #70. 74. BLO: (sc, dec)\*6 (12)

75-82. 12 sc, 7 rnds.

Fasten off and leave a long tail for sewing. If you don't want to sew the head to the body (you can make the head and put on and out), close the hole and fasten off.

### COLLAR:

Attach the thread to the **front** loop of the round **73**: (5 sc, inc)\*3 (21),

all in one stitch: sl st, ch, hdc, next ordinary crocheting : dc, tr, dc, hdc, sl st, ch, hdc, dc, tr, dc, hdc, 9 sc, fasten off.

Pay your **attention** to the **slip stitch** in the 2nd round of the collar, it must be located in the middle of the neck - on its front side. Maybe you will need to make 1-2 shift stitches or you can start the round not from hdc, but from any other stitch without breaking the order.

Spread the collar during crocheting with your fingers, push it to the pajamas to bring it to right shape. Don't crochet TOO TIGHT because it will make the collar look not very nice look.

## PATCH:

Make **9** chain stitches.

from the 2nd stitch from the hook: 8 sc, ch(8)
 2-7.8 sc (8), 6 rnds, fasten off and leave a long tail for sewing.

Stuff the head really tightly. Use the wood stick or a hook with thin handle. The head must have right trapezoidal shape. Put the protrusive part (last 6 rounds) into the head using a wood stick or a hook.



Attach the thread to the **front** loop of the round **32**, which was left after the 33th round and continue crocheting:

 1.24 inc (48)
 2. ch, (hdc, 2 hdc into 1 stitch)\*24 (72), fasten off.







## Working with the head.

*If you like the deep* sight, you could bring the depth to the eyes. You should do it before you will sew the buttons for the eyes.

Mark the points on the head for buttons using pins. I chose the round 17 with 10 stitches distance between them. Use a strong nylon thread for bringing the depth to the eyes. For example, you can use the thread for jeans textile.



**1.**Insert the needle into the neck and pull out in the point where the pin for the left eye is placed.

**2.** Make a little stitch one stitch wide and insert the needle 1 stitch lower and pull it out from the stitch where the pin for the right eye is placed.

**3.** Repeat the previous step, but pull the needle out from the neck area leaving 1 stitch apart from the point where we've started.



After these 3 steps we have 2 thread ends at the neck area and we can bring the desired depth for the eyes pulling them.

**Little tip:** don't cut the thread and fasten off before you will sew the buttons for the eyes. Perhaps you would like to bring more depth to the eyes after sewing them. Also it is much easily to sew the buttons before strong thread tention.

After you reach the result you want make 1-2 strong knots and fasten off.



It's time to sew the eyes-buttons and mark the line for the mouth.

Mouth line is made with one long stitch which is fixed in 3 points with X-stitches (corners of the mouth and its middle).

I've used the same dark-brown thread that was taken for the boots, but did divide it into two strands. Also you could make a little stitch in the area of the left eyebrow. It will bring your Joe's head more ramshackle look.

One more thing you can do - take a litle piece of thread and to tie it around the neck between the head and its wavy edge. It will look like a sling on a jute bag. Make knots on the end of the thread.



#### Working with a pajamas.

We need to sew a couple of buttons to the pajamas, a patch and embroider the bootlaces.

Sew two buttons on the upper part of the pajamas symmetrically to the collar.

I've used the same dark-brown thread I've used for the boots and the neck, also divided in half. Also this thread is used for stitches on the patch.

Choose the place for your patch and sew it working through **both** loops. Make a couple of stitches above with the dark brown thread.



Make two bootlaces on each boot.

The body is ready. All you need is to sew the head if you would like to do this.

Make sure the neck is stuffed really tightly.

You've crochetEd two cylindrical parts (one on the head and another on the neck) to have ability to make the conection between the head and the body flexible and strong without any extra stuff like a wood stick or cotter pins.

Perhaps you would like to leave a head without sewing. It' very typical for Halloween treks.



#### Sewing the head.



**1.** Pull the working thread out from the back side of the neck. Put on the head on the neck and decide how deep it will be installed.

2. Insert the threaded needle into the head's stitch and make a little stitch.

3. Do the same with the stitch on the neck.

Go on along all stitches on the head and the neck. Fasten off and weave in the end.

Although we've sew the head the connection between it and the neck will stay still flexible and movable.





Make a chain of **42** stitches. *Make sure the chain doesn't twist,* then make 1 sl st in the 1st stitch and close it in a circle.

**1-25.** 42 sc (42), *25 rnds,* fasten off and cut the thread for the **1st part of the pants**.

For the **2nd part** make **5** more **sc** after the 25th rnd (check to your crochet density, fold the pant in half, maybe you will need to make less amount of stitches), **don't cut the thread.** 

Prepare for crocheting in reverse direction (counterclock-wise). Pull out the hook from the last stitch and insert it back at the other side. It means the tip of the hook must look into the pants first and it will look out of the pants after.

Also **make sure** you have the same beginning for the 1st leg and for the 2nd leg, work **4 sc** through both parts of the pants. After connecting both legs we continue to crochet in ordinary way: from the right to the left.







The beginning of 2nd part of the pants must be in the same point.



Work 4 sc through both parts of the pants. Step 1.

26 38 sc along the 1st leg, 38 sc alond the 2nd leg, put the marker (76)
27. 76 sc(76)
28. (18 sc, inc)\*4 (80)
29-39. 80 sc (80), 11 rnds, sl st, fasten off.



4 sc through both parts of the pants. Step 1-4.









Hide the thread tail.

#### **UPPER PART**

The upper part of the pants is crocheted in turning rows, but pay your attention that we don't need to make a turning chain after each row. Mark **23 sc** simmetrycally and attach the thread to the right side. Leave a long (abot 50 cm/19,7 inc) tail.

1-2. 23 sc, ch(23)
 3. 23 sc(23)
 4. from the 2nd st from the hook: 20 sc, dec, ch (21)
 5. 21 sc(21)
 6. from the 2nd st from the hook: 18 sc, dec, ch (19)



7. 19 sc (19)
8. from the 2nd st from the hook: 16 sc, dec, ch (17)
9. 17 sc (17)
10. from the 2nd st from the hook: 14 sc, dec, ch (15)
11. 15 sc (15), fasten off.

Crochet along the edge of the upper part of the pants with **sc** using the long tail we have left in the beginning of the work.

### STRIPS

Make chain of **7 stitches**, sl st into the 1st stitch (that is the 1st loop for the button), make chain of **33 stitches**, 4 sc along the upper edge of the pants in the middle of the back, make chain of **39 stitches**, sl st into the 7th stitch from the hook (that is the 2nd loop for the button), crochet back to the beginning along the chain **68 sc**. Cut the thread and fasten off.

Sew the buttons to the upper part of the pants for the strips.











#### Pockets, make 2 pcs

Make a chain of 10 stitches.

from the 2nd st from the hook: 9 sc, ch (9)
 9 sc, ch(9)
 7 sc, dec, ch (8)
 8 sc, ch (8)
 6 sc, dec, ch (7)
 7 sc, ch(7)
 7 sc,
 from the 2nd st from the hook: 6 sc, ch

**9.** from the 2nd st from the hook: 5 sc, **don't cut** the thread, continue to crochet along the edge and leave a long tail for sewing.

Make contrasting stitches along the edge of the pants. Also you can embroider a fly.



## The big one.

The main piece for both the pumpkins is crocheted in turning rows.

Make a chain of **36 stitches**. **1.** from the second st from the hook: 34 sc, ch2, turn the work **2-30. BLO:** 34 sc, ch2, turn the work, *29 rnds* 

### The small one.

Make a chain of **28 stitches. 1.**from the second st from the hook: 26 sc, ch2, turn the work **2-30. BLO**: 26 sc, ch2, turn the work, *29 rnds* 

### Assembling.

Fold the work in half and crochet through both layers with 26/34 sc, don't cut the thread. Close the hole on one side of the pumpkin with the thread, turn the work into the wrong side, If the hole isn't closed, sew it.





Stuff the pumpkin tightly enough and sew the other side.

To make the pumpkin a little bit more realistic you can make a couple of stitches from one side to another one through its body and pull the thread.





#### Pumpkin's spot

1.8 sc in MR (8)

 3. (sc, inc)\*8 (24), fasten off.

Sew the spot to the pumpkin through the back loops only.

## Pumpkin's stem

1.6 sc in MR (6)
2. (sc, inc)\*3 (9)
3. BLO: 9 sc (9)
4-8. 9 sc (9), 5 rnds
9. 2 sc, 3 sl st, 4 sc (9)
10. 9 sc (9)
11. (2 sc, inc)\*3 (12)
12. (sc, inc)\*6 (18), fasten off.
Sew the stem to the pumpkin through the back loops only.











# little crow

With the yarn of **black** color #60.

## Head

1.6 sc in MR (6)
 2. 6 inc (12)
 3. (sc, inc)\*6 (18)
 4. (2 sc, inc)\*6 (24)
 5. (3 sc, inc)\*6 (30)
 6-10. 30 sc (30), 5 rnds
 11. (3 sc, dec)\*6 (24)
 12. (2 sc, dec)\*6 (18)
 13. (sc, dec)\*6 (12), fasten off.

## Body

1.6 sc in MR (6)
 6 inc (12)
 (sc, inc)\*6 (18)
 (2 sc, inc)\*6 (24)
 5-7. 24 sc (24), 3 rnds
 (2 sc, dec)\*6 (18)
 18 sc (18)
 (sc, dec)\*6 (12), fasten off and leave a long tail for sewing the head to the body.







Wings, make 2 pcs

- 1. 3 sc in MR,
- ch5 ch, from the 2nd st from the hook: 4 sc, sl st into the 1st st of MR; ch6, from the 2nd st from the hook: 5 sc, sl st into the 2nd st of MR; ch5, from the 2nd st from the hook: 4 sc, sl st into the 3rd st of MR.

Fasten off and leave a long tail for sewing.





#### Tail

Make a chain of 6 sttches,

from the 2nd st from the hook: 3 sc, hdc, 3 dc into 1st, hdc, 3 sc, fasten off and leave a long tail for sewing.

## Beak

4 sc in MR (4)
 4 inc (8)
 8 sc (8)
 (3 sc, inc)\*2 (10)
 (4 sc, inc)\*2 (12), fasten off and leave a long tail for sewing.

### Legs

3 sc in MR, 3 ch, turn the work and from the 2nd st from the hook: (2 sc, sl st into the st of MR)\*3, fasten off and leave a long tail for sewing.

#### ASSEMBLING

**1.** Mark the points for inserting the eyes with the pins.

Insert the eyes and fix it. *I use household lighter to melt the back side of the eyes.* Also i bring a little bit depth to the crow's eyes.


You can embroider little stitches near the eyes with the white thread.

2. Sew the head to the body, wings, tail, beak and legs.

Attaching a couple of little pieces of black thread to the head you can make funny hair to your little crow.


